

Unveiling Funda Wazi Foundation



he formative years of children, which span the period from birth up to eight years of age, are critical to their overall development. During this stage the interaction of genetics, environment and experience combine to shape the cognitive, social, emotional and physical functions of a child. Children require the utmost attention from parents and caregivers particularly at this stage. Safe spaces must be intentionally created to not only nurture them, but to also forestall emotional neglect, physical and sexual abuse, and other negative interactions that can lead to irreversible impairments.

Dysfunctional adult behaviours like addictions, selfisolation, self-mutilation, mental illness, suicidal tendencies, avoidance of intimacy, compulsively seeking for or avoidance of sex, poor academic performance, etc, are largely traceable to the mismanagement of childhood.

This is why equipping children, parents and caregivers with the information, resources and tools needed to foster development in a safe and conducive environment has become imperative. Recent statistics show that the world is becoming an increasingly unsafe space for children. According to a 2006 UN

report on violence against children:

- 150 million girls and 73 million boys under the age of 18 experienced forced sexual intercourse or other forms of sexual violence in 2002.
- Estimates from Year 2000 suggest that 1.8 million children were forced into prostitution and pornography, and 1.2 million were victims of trafficking and child labour.

Studies suggest that the abuse of children often begins while the child is below the age of 10 years old and continues for years, well into a child's adolescence. Although most reported victims are girls, especially in single parent households, boys between the ages of 5-9 years old have also been shown to be at risk.

In Nigeria, the scale of violence against children and child sexual abuse are difficult to determine because they are typically under-reported. However, existing reports indicate that approximately 760 cases of sexual assault have been recorded in two years with only two convictions in Lagos State.

In many cases, children are discouraged and intimidated from reporting, resulting in repeated cycles of abuse. Parents and guardians have also been known to discourage children from reporting due to stigmatisation and fear of being wrongly labelled. It therefore becomes important for children and adults to be properly equipped and empowered with the requisite knowledge and information they need to protect children and sustain the environment that allows them grow into their full potentials.

It is against this background that the Funda Wazi Foundation was founded in May 2015, to help provide a child-friendly environment for learning, and to promote educational development in children.

Funda Wazi, a Zulu term meaning "learn and know," was founded by Mrs. Nomthi Odukoya, a seasoned child educator, author and pastor. The organisation is dedicated to deploying resources and tools to enable children, parents and caregivers understand and effectively address the growing social challenges facing children, primarily in Nigeria.

Since its inception in May 2015, the foundation has:

- Distributed free copies of its books and resources to primary schools within the Ilupeju axis of Lagos State.
- Organised talks and fora where key stakeholders were brought together to address critical issues affecting children.
- Enlisted the support of parents and teachers, who through the Foundation's efforts have become more aware of effects of child abuse, to help champion the rights of children in the community.

These interventions have continued to empower children, parents and caregivers alike to create and sustain the requisite safe spaces children need to develop, with outstanding testimonies emanating from homes, schools, churches and communities. But there is still so much ground to cover.

The physical, sexual and emotional abuse of children and other forms of social challenges are still prevalent in our society. The Funda Wazi Foundation seeks to close the gap through:

- The distribution of more books, materials and tools that will serve as 'conversation starters' for children and adults on difficult topics.
- The organisation of more fora that will bring key stakeholders together to address critical issues affecting children.
- The carrying out of informed advocacy to influence policies, practices and processes that affect children.
- Using social media platforms to inform the public on topical issues affecting children.
- Building the capacity of stakeholders to use resources to address challenges facing children.

- Building partnerships and collaborations with other NGOs, government agencies and bilateral and multilateral organisations.
- Carrying out empirical research on issues affecting children's social, emotional and physical well-being.

The foundation, in the near future, also intends to focus on the following areas:

- Operating affordable community–based crèches in underprivileged urban communities.
- Influencing policies and processes that affect Funda Wazi's focus areas.
- Offering hope, encouragement and practical advice to children and women who have been abused, as well as providing answers to some vital questions.

Did You Know?

Nigeria's Senate passed a bill in 2015 that approved life imprisonment for rapists and those who have sex with children under 11 years old. The legislation could help build a stronger law against sexual crimes in the West African country where scores of women and children are subject to rape and sexual violence.

The bill included various sentences and fines for other sexual offenses such as incest, child pornography, sexual tourism, gang rape, sexual harassment, prostitution of mentally disabled persons, lacing drinks with drugs with intent to sexually abuse, and deliberately infecting someone with HIV and other diseases. The bill also mandated the storing of names of sex offenders in a database.
